MINUTES:

Traci Schumacher- School Council President, called the meeting to order at 9:08 am. Committee members signed in and were provided agendas.

Georgetown students participated in the Martin Luther King Parade. On Friday, February 24 Georgetown students will participate in the Black History Program. These activities are supported and implemented by Georgetown K8 teachers who make up our Black History Committee. These teachers put a lot of work into these activities.

School Board Representative, Mr. Lower, stated that bell times will remain the same for the upcoming school year.

Georgetown PTA fundraisers: Mcteacher Night (no date on this as of yet- some time in February) and on April 22 (Color Run) participants will pay online. The Color Run will stay on Georgetown property.

The school is now fully staffed in all areas.

There was discussion as to whether the next School Council meeting should be held on May 11 or on May 18 which was set aside as a make- up day if needed. It was stated that current SRI/ MAP scores would not be available on May 11. No decision was made. The decision will be made as this time gets closer.

The most recent CCPRI scores were presented. Georgetown is the only middle school in the district to receive 40 out of 40 points on the CCPRI. Georgetown's elementary received 33 out of 40 points.

Data was reviewed. SRI, MAP, GMAS discussed briefly. Writing needs to be a big area of focus for remediation. The following are being implemented in order to remediate other areas of

concern: Number Talks (mental math- students are encouraged to develop and use thinking strategies), Flex (remediation in specific areas of weakness- deficit areas are pinpointed), Vocabulary training for faculty (focus is to encourage students to use more formal vocabulary when speaking).

Advanced content classes and high school credit classes are offered for students who are functioning at a higher level.

Special education students continue to make up the majority of the below basic scores that were obtained. Georgetown currently has 115 SPED students.
