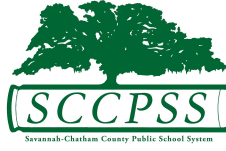


2019-2020 SCCPSS Summer Reading Program

Grades 9-12



Why summer reading?

While reading during summer vacation may not be a priority for most high school students, it is critical to a student's ability to not only retain information learned the previous year, but also to grow in knowledge and literacy skills in preparation for the year ahead. Many experts liken reading to exercise. Just like exercising keeps your heart and muscles in shape, so too does reading keep your brain in shape. If you don't exercise - you lose muscle. If you don't read - you lose literacy skills.

A study done at the University of Tennessee found that children and teens who did not read over the summer lose the equivalent of two months of literacy development, while students who did read gained a month. Because of this, when school begins in the fall there is likely to be a three month difference in literacy readiness between those who read over the summer and those who didn't - an unfortunate fact known as the "summer slide."

Reading over the summer is not a suggestion to keep kids busy; on the contrary, it is a critical requirement to help students stay on track for their entire educational career and beyond.

Program Overview:

High school students are expected to read or listen to between 2-5 books over the summer (see chart below for specific requirements). While SCCPSS does provide a list of recommended texts and their associated Lexile levels, it is most important that students select books that are of interest to them. Secondly, students should aim to select books close to their instructional level.

Upon return to school in the fall, all students will have until **August 26, 2019** to electronically submit a summary and personal reflection for each book read.

In each electronic submission, students will use a Google form to submit a two-paragraph summary of their book as well as a two-paragraph reflection of their thoughts, feelings, connections made, and/or analysis of author's craft and purpose. All student entries will be reviewed by the English department and those that meet requirements will be submitted for district-wide prize drawings, including class sets of books, pizza, classroom technology, dress down days and more. The more submissions per student and per school, the more likely students and schools can win multiple prize packages.

No library cards or credentials are needed, and once the audiobook is downloaded to the device wifi is not needed to listen. All summer long, two new audiobooks are released each week on Thursdays and are available to download for one week until the new books are released. There is no limit to how many books you can download!
